Where Do We Go From Here?

e have navigated through many months of 2021, and we still are experiencing some ups and downs. We went from not being able to even be in our building to enjoying indoor activities with rules and limitations. As I am writing this, it is still unclear when we will be able to come together in our building without wearing masks. The hope is that there will be positive changes that will bring us back to getting together without masks, distancing, and/or limits on how many can be in one place at the same time.

When changes began in March of 2020, churches and their congregations were thrown for a loop! Some were totally shut down and unable to connect in any way. Others were blessed with technology which allowed them to record worship and either distribute DVDs or broadcast the recordings through digital media. A few fortunate congregations (ours was so blessed) were able to begin livestreaming their worship services. There were, of course, congregations which decided not to change their worship service and continued to meet as they had always done. Some had masking and social distancing precautions, and some made absolutely no changes whatsoever. It is safe to say that every way to decide to proceed was chosen by some congregation somewhere.

There were two issues that faced every congregation regardless of the choice made: will we lose members, and will we receive enough money to continue. Westminster's Session tried to base decisions on presbytery, CDC, state government recommendations, and the impact decisions would have on the safety and wellbeing of our church family. The Session created a task force to analyze information and give recommendations based on that information. Were we concerned about finances? Of



course, we were! We had staff and building to consider. We had a loan to repay. We had begun the process of calling a pastor. There was a whole lot of praying going on! Westminster's Session had one major thing going for them: Our faith in our church family! We were secure in the knowledge that our church family has a great love for each other and in continuing to do God's work in our community and beyond.

We carried on and met financial obligations, supported mission, and (to our great joy) called a new pastor to join our church family. God is good! We also reached out to the members of our church family to make sure we did not lose contact. We met outside. We Zoomed. We emailed. We used our website and Facebook page to share information. We called. Some of us went old-school and used the U.S. Postal Service to keep connected.

Now it is time to begin thinking about what we will be doing and where we will be going in 2022. What will our world look like? Will things be closer to pre-Covid times, or will we still have to deal with some of the Covid precautions? What changes that were made in 2020 and 2021 do we wish to continue, and will they require additional funding to do so? What longtime programs need to be changed and receive increased funding? Which ministries here at Westminster need to grow?

Following is not always the easiest thing to do. Following someone in your car from one place to another can be frustrating. You might be used to going at a different speed than the person you are following. You might get stopped at a traffic light that the leader makes it through. You might need to take a break from driving while the other person is fine just to keep going.

Following someone in a leadership position, at your job, or in a relationship, can also be difficult. There will always be comparisons to the previous person that filled the role you now fill, whether intentional or not. As we have been reading the Hebrew Scripture narratives about Saul and David, we have seen this very clearly. Our ancestors in the faith constantly compared their leaders to Moses, Aaron, Joshua, and Jacob. While not always helpful, there is some good that can come out of comparing

ourselves to the leaders that we follow. If we seek to learn from the good examples set by the ones we follow, we will grow in our own roles as leaders, and as followers. For the Hebrew people, this happened individually, and communally.

This fall, we are embarking on a new journey together as followers of Jesus. "Following

Jesus is a lifelong journey where we learn and do what Jesus said and did. It takes more than the head, checking off boxes of belief. It even takes more than the heart, feeling deeply about another person or a cause. Following Jesus is about these things and more. It is also about doing. And it takes practice. And practice. And more practice. We are not practicing for perfection, however, but practicing to put faith and love into action. As we explore faith practices, we are diving into the essence of what makes us Christian, those who follow the one who practiced what he preached!"

As we journey together down this road to more active discipleship, we will be using a new, churchwide, intergenerational curriculum that will be incorporated into all aspects of our worship, education, and work together. The Biblical focus

and practices will be the focus in worship on Sunday mornings, our children's and adult Sunday School and Bible study lessons, our youth group discussions, and even our intergenerational and fellowship events.

"Follow Me: Biblical Practices for Faithful Living is [designed to help] people of all ages follow Jesus. This study is for lifelong Christians and those beginning to ask questions. Each unit centers around something Jesus told his followers to do." As we look at many of the practices that we will focus on, you may "notice many familiar words associated with the Christian faith and, to be honest, with just being a good person. Jesus, however, took these well-known behaviors, feelings, and attitudes and showed those around him—people throughout history and us today—how we can love God and love others. In each unit, aspects of the practice are

explored; biblical stories illustrate them and how the Christian community has understood them through more than two thousand years. More important, there are ample opportunities for you to practice these actions, both individually and in community."

We do things better as a community. In community we can lift each other up and

encourage one another along our faith journeys. We support and pray for one another. When one of us stumbles, we can help steady a misstep, and pick each other up when we fall. Following Jesus is a commitment, a challenge, and a joy, the rewards of which will be seen in our strengthening relationships, our growing community, and the love that we share with all those around us. I am excited to join you on this journey!

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION FOR CHILDREN & YOUTH

For our youth pre-K through 4th grade, beginning September 12 during our Sunday School hour (9:00 every Sunday morning) and Children's Church (2nd and 4th Sundays during worship service), our children will explore what it means to "Follow Jesus" both at home and in our community.

Before each job interview,
Andrew slips on his father's gold
watch. It's a weighty piece of
jewelry, a reminder of his
father's long and successful
career and he feels more
confident when wearing it. At
holiday time, Mandy puts her
mother's cut glass water
decanter on the dinner table and
is flooded with joyful memories
of her mother's love and
guidance as well as the
wonderful meals she prepared
for the family.

The watch and the decanter are linking objects, items belonging to deceased loved ones that provide a source of solace for both Andrew and Mandy. A I linking object is literally any object or image that connects the griever in a comforting way with a loved one. Linking objects can be used to create a : ritual of remembrance and continuity as well as a reminder of a needed behavior when establishing new routines. They are used to create powerful connections that can last for months or even years.



A common fear people often mention after a death is that treasured memories will begin to fade away. So when death is still new and raw, we tend to think that everything that was important to the deceased becomes important to us simply because it was important to him or her. We hold tight to every physical reminder — from toothbrushes to cashmere sweaters. But problems can arise when we accumulate too many possessions that take up too much space. Over time, this memory clutter can begin to impede our ability to feel a sense of peace and calm. That's when using a linking object can provide a bridge to memories.

The use of linking objects wasn't always widely recommended by grief experts because many falsely believed that these objects tended to encourage a pathological holding on to the deceased while neglecting the task of reinvesting in life. In reality, though, linking objects can be pivotal motivating factors in accepting the death of a loved one and beginning the new life without the physical presence of the deceased. These objects are one type of learning tool to bring empathy, understanding, and awareness of enduring love into the experience of massive

change. Psychotherapist Thomas Moore put it another way when he wrote, "Grief is complete only with a shift in being, in the way you live, think, and relate to the world." You can emerge from your sorrow and sadness with new strength, compassion, and vision you never realized you possessed.

Creating Liking Objects

Are you interested in creating a linking object? Here are a few things to keep in mind when utilizing this important coping tool

- 1. Pick any object that belonged to the deceased that has special meaning for you. It could be a key chain, coin, medal, photo, piece of clothing or jewelry. It could be something your loved one purchased for you or something you bought when you were with this person. Carry or wear this object when you long for comfort or connection.
- 2. Another type of linking object is to choose a word or saying that is descriptive of the character or essence of your loved one. Take it to a calligrapher and have it written so that it can be framed or reproduced. It can then be placed in various locations that are meaningful to you and used as an inspiration, tribute or reminder.

3. Call on your creativity to bring special meaning from a linking object. One woman took her husband's wedding band and hers to a jeweler where they were melted down and made into a new piece of jewelry that symbolized their enduring love. Look online to find symbolic meanings to various objects or colors. For example, the color green is symbolic of life and growth. Decide how you can weave the information you find into the choice of your linking object.

Linking objects are transitional items that assist the griever in maintaining a healthy bond of remembrance and thanksgiving, as one begins the journey to find new ways to reinvest emotional energy into life. While others may not see the significance, a linking object can have intimate meaning for the person who is grieving a love one's death.

The Power of Talking

Many people have grown up in families where expressing strong

emotion was discouraged. Maintaining the "stiff upper lip" was considered the best way to cope with loss.

Keeping feelings bottled inside can lead to physical symptoms. In fact, just the opposite is true: talking is healing. Talking enables the person who is grieving to locate the pain, bring it to the surface and release it.



Because the pain of grief does't magically disappear, we need to talk about a particular feeling or memory again and again. In fact, it's been said that people who are grieving need to share their story of loss 50 to 100 times. The number isn't as important as the telling, that talking helps release pain and helps the griever make sense of the magnitude of their loss.

The key to talking through grief is finding people who will listen without offering advice or cheerful cliches. These are what we call healing people, H-E-A-L:

H is for Here — People who make time for you because they know their presence is one of the best gifts they can provide.

E is for Empathetic — While no one can truly know what your'e feeling, people with empathy do their best to understand and let some of your pain touch them.

A is for Accepting — These people don't judge you, try to change you, or tell you what you should do or how you should thank.

L is for Listening — They focus on what you have to say. They let you share your feelings, as raw as they may be, and know how important it is to tell your story again and again.
